## How to – Shooting Prepared - Find Inspiration and Surprises by Craig Clark

I was recently inspired to create a special photo gift for a friend. I wanted to photograph the letters of their name, and put them together into a frame. So I jumped in the car and headed out. But where was I going to find these "letters". Here we go; our own personal alphabet scavenger-hunt.

I had a great idea, so now how was I going to accomplish the goal. As part of my planning, I began to review some of the places I'd been that would reveal creative letters and architecture that would represent letters. We headed over to the Sellwood Antique District on 13th and began to visit some of those great shops. What better way to capture some great letters than to visit some of days gone by. Well this is going to be a huge project as we explore our surroundings and target the alphabet.

Now I have what and where, I need more planning for the "how". The next part of the process was making sure I had the right equipment. Since the goal was to create single frames of each letter. Since I was aiming to fill the frame with a single letter, I decided to use my 105mm macro lens. This would allow me to move in close enough on almost any size letter and fill the frame. I'll be excited to explore some of Portland's architecture and neighborhoods for some fun letters and shapes to fulfill the goal. Portland's bridges, buildings and parks should provide a great opportunity to fill the frame with letters and characters.

And now the surprise... While exploring for my alphabet goldmine I was pleasantly surprised with a plethora of photo opportunities on the shelves in front of me. In the midst of my alphabet were toys & treasures & tools, oh my!

I went prepared for an alphabet search and was rewarded with letters and more. It is always good to explore with a goal, but don't let the goal block your vision for more. I took a picture of the letter and turned to find a pattern of lights & textures. I was quickly reminded to not work myself out of the fun of shooting.

## TIPS & TRICKS: B&W Conversion in Lightroom by Gregg Kerber

Adobe Photoshop Lightroom is a powerful editing tool designed just for photographers. As with many software programs, Lightroom allows photographers to perform various tasks several different ways. B&W conversion is no exception. Below are the the methods by which you can convert images to B&W.

#### Click 'Black & White' in the Basic panel.

This converts the image to B&W and changes the HSL panel to the 'B&W' Panel. This allows you to control luminance (brightness) of the tones (based on color channels).

#### Desaturate the image with the 'Saturation' color channel sliders in the HSL Panel (the method I use the most).

This method desaturates all color channels thus rendering it B&W.

This allows you to add colors tones back in the image. It also allows you to control luminance (brightness) of the tones (based on color channels) in the HSL Luminance Panel.

#### Set the 'Saturation' slider in the Basic Panel to -100.

This method renders the image in B&W but also takes away all control in the HSL sliders.
